## The problem: many women left uninformed and unprotected

- Women worldwide face stigma, which prevents them from openly talking and accessing information about their reproductive health and rights.
- Lack of access to information and education exposes women, especially girls and young women, to various sexually transmitted infections (STIs). STIs impact women’s wellbeing through stigmatization, infertility, and even cancers and pregnancy complications.
- Over 95% of maternal deaths occur in developing countries, with a lack of health information and quality services being a significant factor.

## CLEAR Global’s solution

CLEAR Global partners with women’s rights and health organizations to make sexual and reproductive health information accessible in the languages and formats women understand. With our innovative communication solutions, women can access educational resources, healthcare services, and support. They can also share their concerns and receive answers safely and securely.

During [the Zika virus response](#), we worked with the World Health Organization to produce videos with advice for pregnant women from Haiti and Brazil. The videos were subtitled and voiced in Haitian Creole and Brazilian Portuguese.

In [Kenya](#), our translations of educational materials and health care posters for community clinics enabled rural health workers and educators to deliver information about neonatal breastfeeding tips in local languages for the first time.

As part of our [Rohingya response in Bangladesh](#), we organized focus groups to better understand how Rohingya women in Cox’s Bazar camp speak about their health and traumatic experiences. This enabled us to create language resources, such as audio recordings and glossaries, so that aid workers can better listen to and address women’s needs.

“Good communication is vital if we’re to ensure traumatized people who have already suffered so much get the right support. A third of Rohingya women in the camps said they did not feel safe leaving their shelters – we need to fully understand why this is, so we can do a better job protecting women.”
